Trimester 2 (Jan.-Mar)	4	5 weeks	<p><b>This unit focuses on analyzing characters while reading traditional literature. They will determine theme, central message, or moral, and look at the relationship between illustrations and words in a story. 5	5 weeks	<p><b>This unit focuses on exploring point of view and perspective in both fiction and informational text. Students explore characters' perspectives on events in stories, and then move on to reading informational text and considering authors' perspectives on issues. <b>Unit 5 Resources</b>							
Trimester 3 (Mar-June)	6	6 weeks	<p><b>This unit focuses on author study, comparing characters, plots, or themes in multiple texts by the same author. Students will produce two pieces of writing. The first is an opinion piece in which they identify commonalities (such as similar characters or recurring themes) and back their ideas up with textual evidence.
